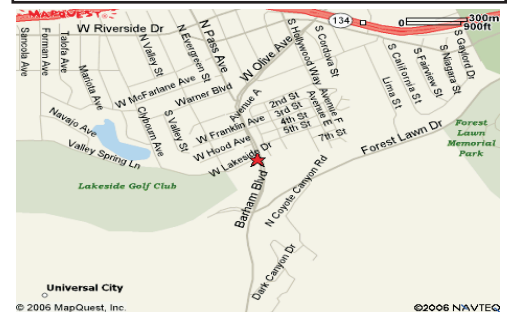

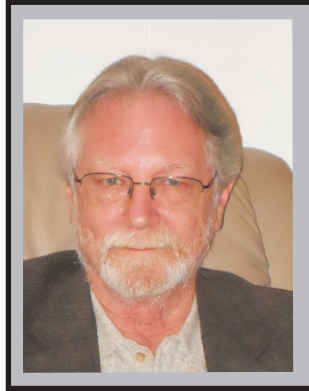
Reading and listening to talk immediately after the election there seemed to be a lot of rancor among Republicans as to who was responsible for some of our high profile losses as well as victories. Some Republicans are claiming that the Tea Party Movement was responsible for nominating 'flakes' such as O'Donnell, Angle and others that cost Republicans seats which they otherwise would have had. On the other hand one Tea Party Spokesperson claimed that out of 129 candidates supported by the Tea Party Express, 113 were elected.

So what now is the future of the Tea Party Movement, has it had its day, and will it now fade away or have we just seen the beginning? Will they be so alienated by the Republican Establishment's hostility that they decide to form a third party, or will they see their future as taking over the Party?

From the President's Desk---

I woke up Wednesday morning after the election feeling very depressed and frustrated. What happened? Did the Republican tsunami just run out of gas before it reached the West Coast? Or is California so hopelessly Liberal Democrat that we Republicans don't stand a chance. Or, as has been suggested by some, is the California Republican Leadership under Arnold Schwarzenegger just incompetent? Or has been suggested by others, just non-existent?

As this may have been the last general election in which a Republican will be on the ballot for a State Office, (Due to the Open Primary Law passed by California as Proposition 14 in June of 2010), it is obviously time for the Republican Party to re-assess itself and its future in California. And I wonder how, or if, we (SCRW&M) can be a part of that? Jane Barnett has said this is not the time for Monday morning quarter backing, but to continue without analyzing what is going wrong is to repeat doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result.

As of October the percentages of registered voters in California were:

Democrats 2,260,449
 Republicans 1,048,609
 D-T-S 911,394
 Other parties 215,556

Democrats have a better than 2 to 1 advantage in the State, and close to 4 to 1 in LA County. But, in LA County, RPLAC under Jane Barnett, since May 2009, have had a net increase in Republicans of 31,366 voters. The five months prior showed a net loss of 7,262. In 2010 Republican Registration had a net gain of 36,712 in LA County. But even if we did that well every year for the next four years we would still be way behind.

When Susan and I heard the results in California Wednesday morning we looked at each other and she asked, "Is it time to fix up the house, sell it and move out of the State?" I thought about it but came to the conclusion that I would rather stay. Maybe I'll stay and fight to get the Conservative message out, or maybe I'll stay and do anything I can to hurry the State toward its fated bankruptcy. Maybe picking up the pieces and putting them back together again after the crash is the only option left to us. Under a Liberal Governor, with a Liberal majority in the California Congress, with the ability now to pass a budget with a mere majority, I would say the crash cannot be far away.

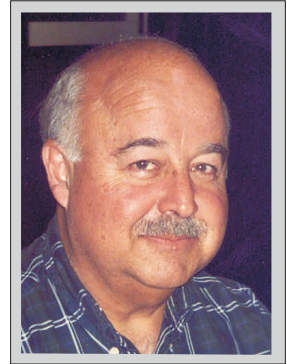

There really isn't much positive to say, other than we may have captured two Democrat Congressional seats, and cemented in drawing new district lines by a non-partisan citizens' commission instead of the legislature. That could help – at least a bit – bring additional GOP victories at the legislative and congressional level in 2012, but it's hard to look at the statewide returns and gain any solace.

A friend of mine and longtime political activist in Sacramento had a great description of what is going on: “California is behaving like an adolescent: self-centered, smug, irresponsible and unaware of its surroundings ... eventually, however, it will be compelled to mature and take on responsibility (if it doesn't kill itself before then).”

The Democrats now control everything, including the ability to pass a budget with a simply majority vote. They may rue the day. There are no more Republicans in position of power to blame for the coming budgetary meltdowns. The state is billions of dollars in debt today, and that number is increasing exponentially.

Does Jerry Brown have the inclination or the will to take on the public employee unions? He may well make a show of trying – but in the end no meaningful spending or salary/pension reforms will take place. That will drive the state further into debt, which in turn will drive up the interest rate needed to be paid on our bonds in order to induce wary investors to buy them. Buying a California bond is like buying an arsonist a can of gasoline and a book of matches.

Ah well - - it will at least be interesting to watch the conflagration. And I take comfort in the biblical assurance that there will always be a “saving remnant” left in the land. At the moment that appears to be us...so as Winston Churchill once said, let us be of good cheer, and gird ourselves to do our duty”. The October public affairs and politics Forum of SCRWM featured a lively airing and exchange of views. For those who have not attended one of our meetings, the Forum is simply an opportunity to express your views on political questions and issues in the news. The moderator (your truly) poses the questions, and everyone, members, guests and visitors, is very welcome to express your own opinions.

Among the questions discussed were the following:

What does the economy need? **Ron:** "A political landscape that puts the U.S. people first."

PROPOSITIONS & LOCAL MEASURES

PROPOSITION 19 – OPPOSE LOST

Changes California Law to Legalize Marijuana and Allow It to Be Regulated and Taxed.

PROPOSITION 20 – SUPPORT WON

Redistricting of Congressional Districts.

PROPOSITION 21 – OPPOSE LOST

Establishes \$18 Annual Vehicle License Surcharge to Help Fund State Parks and Wildlife Programs and Grants Free Admission to All State Parks to Surcharged Vehicles.

PROPOSITION 22 - OPPOSE WON

Prohibits the State from Taking Funds Used for Transportation or Local Government Projects and Services.

PROPOSITION 23 - STRONGLY SUPPORT LOST

Suspends Air Pollution Control Laws Requiring Major Polluters to Report and Reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions That Cause Global Warming Until Unemployment Drops Below Specified Level for Full Year.

PROPOSITION 24 – OPPOSE LOST

Repeals Recent Legislation That Would Allow Businesses to Carry Back Losses, Share Tax Credits, and Use a Sales-Based Income Calculation to Lower Taxable Income.

PROPOSITION 25 - HELL NO, STRONGLY OPPOSE WON

Changes Legislative Vote Requirement to Pass a Budget from Two-Thirds to a Simple Majority. Retains Two-Thirds Vote Requirement for Taxes.

PROPOSITION 26 – SUPPORT WON

Increases Legislative Vote Requirement to Two-Thirds for State Levies and Charges. Imposes Additional Requirement for Voters to Approve Local Levies and Charges with Limited Exceptions.

PROPOSITION 27 – STRONGLY OPPOSE LOST

Eliminates State Commission on Redistricting. Consolidates Authority for Redistricting with Elected Representatives.
